## **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT**

#### YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

## **Formation and Purpose**

East Lothian Community Rail Partnership (ELCRP) was formed on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2015. The purpose of ELCRP is to provide a bridge between the East Lothian Community and ScotRail with a view to improving the travelling experience for passengers using local day to day knowledge to resolve minor problems.

ELCRP's area of operation includes the Edinburgh (Waverley) to North Berwick and Edinburgh (Waverley) to Dunbar services covering the intermediate stations of Musselburgh, Wallyford, Prestonpans, Longniddry, Drem, and North Berwick, with Dunbar in addition.

## **Aims and Objectives**

- Support the local economy by promoting rail use and rail facilities.
- Actively promote the use of rail and other public and low carbon-emitting transport.
- Support safety, security and access initiatives relating to railway use.
- Work with the station adopters to provide a more pleasant environment within the station areas.

All of the above to involve local organisations and people in achieving progress.

- To increase the user-friendliness and accessibility of the rail services.
- To assist in rail-related developments that benefit local businesses.
- To support station development projects along the Railway Line.
- To identify and encourage possible growth markets for the rail service.
- To work with the local tourism industry to further promote the use of rail travel.
- To work proactively and positively with other transport providers in the area.
- To identify potential external funding for projects which meet these objectives and work to secure such funding.

These aims and objectives for ELCRP will be delivered through programmes of work agreed by the Board.

## **Recruitment and Appointment of Board**

There will be a core Board comprising key people and in addition stakeholders who have an interest in the railway as part of their remit.

All the founding Board members were appointed on the inception of partnership. The officers of ELCRP will be elected by members of the Board and shall comprise a Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary, each to be elected for a minimum term of 2 years. The officers will automatically become Board members when elected.

The members of the Board other than the office bearers will in future, be appointed annually at the AGM and may be nominated by the key areas identified. Some may formally appoint deputies to attend in their absence.

## **Governing Document**

ELCRP is an unincorporated organisation and the purposes and administration arrangements are set out in our constitution.

## **Activities and Achivements**

The year ending 31<sup>st</sup> March 2020 has been another successful one for the Community Rail Partnership. We undertook a number of smaller projects in addition to our now annual production of our line guide, 13,000 of which were printed and distributed to all guest houses and hotels in East Lothian, plus to Central Scotland railway stations and to a number of high profile museums. We are working with Queen Margaret University to produce a totally revised version of the line guide hopefully for production in 2021. However, our annual funding from ScotRail was not received this year until 31<sup>st</sup> March 2020, about three months later than usual (in line with all other Scottish Community Rail Partnerships) and this created real logistical issues in committing ourselves to the 2020 line guide as it has to be printed and distributed by Easter. The late receipt of funds meant that we were unable to proceed with this project for the first time and whilst the COVID 19 situation intervened, it is essential in future years that funding from ScotRail is received in time to enable us to prepare for any Easter events and projects.

We also sponsored Musselburgh Windsor Football Club, one of the largest in Scotland with over 600 youths, both male and female, in a joint financing of their strip. Another highly successful project concerned the creation of posters by pARTicipate, a North Berwick and wider East Lothian based art group who produced posters of North Berwick extolling the virtues of the town for the 2019 Fringe by the Sea festival. We had been working with them since February in conjunction with four other local voluntary concerns, but ScotRail did not produce the poster grips until October, about two months after the event, but nevertheless they were immediately put up and because of their timeless nature remain up at North Berwick station. The quality of the posters was praised by the leaders of the art group.

I mentioned in last year's report that ScotRail ceased funding ACORP (now Community Rail Network or CRN) other than annual subscriptions for the nine Scottish CRPs. Six of these CRPs, including ourselves, commissioned a report prepared by Professor Paul Salveson, who was responsible for the introduction of the very first CRPs in England many years ago, on the future structure of Scottish CRPs. The final determination in this respect has still to be ascertained and put into effect.

I continue to answer queries that come through our website, often from people who are concerned regarding potential future developments on the East Coast mainline relating to their properties which are adjacent to the line, and these are answered as best I can. It is however good to report that the reliability of the ScotRail service has improved immeasurably over the past year and this makes life much easier for the CRP who are often, but wrongly, seen as being partly responsible for the train operating company problems, as people think we are part of ScotRail, which we are not. A new fleet of class 385 electric units has been introduced, usually in 6 car form which has increased capacity to acceptable levels. These, built by Hitachi, mostly in County Durham, are proving to be the most reliable electric units in the UK which certainly makes it easier for ScotRail to operate reliability.

# **Activities and Achivements (continued)**

I must pass on my thanks for the support shown by many members of the CRP over the past year and in particular Allison Cosgrove who acts as Secretary and Treasurer and to Jacqui Bell who has come onto our Board/Steering Group.

I also mentioned in last year's report that I am standing down as Chair at the 2020 AGM. The timing of this will depend on when the AGM will be held due to the COVID 19 crisis and this has still to be decided. It is disappointing that nobody has come forward to replace me, and as I write this a Steering Committee meeting will be held to determine the way forward.

# **Board Remuneration and Expenses**

The Board members did not receive any remuneration during the year from ELCRP. One board member was reimbursed £100.67 of expenses

## Reserves

At the year end, ELCRP retained funds held within deferred income of £11,131 (2019: £11,235) which will be used for the general aims and purposes of the ELCRP.

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

## **Grant income**

Grant income is charged to the income and expenditure account when paid or, if earlier, when payment becomes certain.

## **Grant Promised**

Grants promised are treated only as contingent liabilities when there is no certainty that the potential recipients will fulfil conditions and apply for payment.

## **Taxation**

Taxation for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in the Income Statement, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Current or deferred taxation assets and labilities are not discounted.

Current tax is recognised at the amount of tax payable using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

## **Deferred tax**

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date.
